PLANT A TREE FOR THE JUBILEE!

An exciting project for a special celebration

NEWS FROM THE BELFRY

A Happy New Year to Everyone!

2022 has the promise of being the start of a return to more normal times, though probably not on 1st January.



Even so, you may have decided that it is now time to get out more, perhaps to be more active, acquire a new skill or make new friends. If so, why not consider bell ringing? Learning to ring church bells ticks all those boxes and more, occurring regularly, for an hour or so a week with instruction and equipment provided free of charge and can be a very absorbing pastime for all. Many new ringers take it up as a hobby later in life when they have more time and a common lament is 'I wish I had started sooner!' and 'I never knew there was so much to it!'

Ringing is well within the capabilities of most people but is a universal truth that the older you get the more difficult it is to acquire a new skill. Research shows though that there are many benefits to learning something new and keeping the mind and body active. Ringing is also a very sociable activity where many new friendships are made. The band of ringers have to collaborate to achieve a common goal and fit together particularly in terms of the sound heard outside and being considerate of the neighbours.

Anyone interested in finding out more is welcome to come along and have a go, under supervision, or just to watch. Under current circumstances please contact Sue first as there are still some restrictions in place at the time of writing and may be for some time yet. If you decide to take it further then individual sessions are arranged at a mutually convenient time and handling a bell can be achieved in as little as a few hours.

There is a clear path of progression when learning to ring, with some overlap: first, bell handling such that you can ring independently without a helper standing nearby, then bell control to keep the bell striking in the right place. Once these skills are mastered there is the added difficulty of ringing with others, keeping your place ringing in rounds and then to be able to follow simple call changes. At this stage we move on to the building blocks for method ringing.

Not all ringers want to go beyond call changes but the keener ones will find there is always something new to achieve and a supportive community ready to assist those willing to make the effort.

UNITED CHARITIES OCKLEY

The correspondent and trustees of the charity have changed. Tim Pryke has retired as Treasurer having been a trustee for 19 years and David Ansell a trustee for 24 years stalwart service.

Dick Thomas joined the Trustees last year and has kindly taken on as Treasurer.

The majority of the income each year comes from the Henry Smith Charity and is mostly used to give Christmas boxes to the deserving with Ockley connections. Henry Smith was born in 1548 and was a wealthy London businessman who lived in Wandsworth, then in the County of Surrey. During his life he amassed large landholdings which he transferred to a Charity. After his death in 1628 the Trustees allocated the income of the various estates to Parishes, mostly in Surrey. Ockley receives 6/156 approximately 3.8% of the income from the Worth Estate. Abinger gets 8/156 and Betchworth 10/156. The Worth estate was sold, but the proceeds kept separate, wisely invested and the Worth Estate income is nearly £200k.

In his will, he instructed his executors to invest £2,000 in agricultural land and they bought a farm of 116 acres in Kensington. 200 years later this was developed as Onslow Square and the surrounding area (Lord Onslow was chairman of the trustees at the time). The objects of that charity were the relief of poverty of his poor kindred (the descendants of his sister) and the rescue of Barbary slaves (people captured by pirates of the Barbary coast, being the African coast of the Mediterranean. The pirates raided the Cornish and Devon coast as well as ships!). The object of the rescue of Barbary slaves was a common charitable object of the time.

A few years ago, the two charities (London and Estates) were amalgamated, they already had the same Trustees,

and the Charity makes over £20million of charitable donations a year. The objects of the Charities were widened over the years, there are few Barbary slaves, but donations only go to charities within the United Kingdom.

The Ockley Charity has its own trust deed. An earlier trust deed suggests that the relief of the poor includes provision for the elderly, apprentice fees for young men and dowries for young ladies. At one stage Ockley provided warm flannel to the elderly for making garments or bed clothes, later this changed to a delivery of coal which slowly transmuted into cash payments as fewer and fewer people burnt coal.

A mistaken rumor about Henry Smith, to explain the uneven amounts of money distributed to the different parishes, is that Henry Smith toured Surrey as a vagrant and where he was welcomed gave more to the Parish! This is totally untrue, there was a 'Dog' Smith who did tour as a vagrant but had no connection, unfortunately the story is still proclaimed on an old Surrey map which is available from Surrey County Council!

A LEGEND OF SAXON TIMES - THE BATTLE OF OCKLEY

An abridged version of a story by prominent Surrey Historian Mr W.H. Chouler FRSA, ACP written in the late 1960's.

There has been one famous battle fought in Surrey, a battle that took place so far back in the mists of time, that few people have ever heard of it for it seldom receives even the slightest mention in any history book. One book gives it three lines, telling us that the battle took place in A.D. 851, at Aclea or Ockley in the Wylde. That book is the Anglo Saxon Chronicle, begun about the middle of the twelfth century. The Chronicle, "the earliest and most venerable monument of English prose", was written in the monasteries by generations of monks.

In the ninth century England was attacked by the Vikings, the most daring set of invaders yet seen upon the seas, who came from the mountainous fiords of Norway and Sweden. According to the Anglo Saxon Chronicle, the spasmodic raids of single boat loads of pirates gave place to highly organised forays of anything up to fifty boats after A.D. 825.

In A.D. 850 the largest band of all set sail. They crossed the North Sea in open boats each about seventy feet long, with high prows carved to resemble dragons. In each boat were sixty men, whose painted shields hung over the sides. Without maps or compasses, and using only oars and sails, these men crossed the rough North Sea until they reached the estuary of the River Thames.

Ethelstan, the King, hurried to drive off the invaders, but his army was utterly defeated, and he was cruelly murdered, while Canterbury, his capital, was burnt to the ground. The whole of Kent was plundered, and great riches were taken to the Danish Camps. From Monasteries and Churches, warning bells rang out, while monks and abbots prayed unceasingly for help against the invaders: "A furore Norman norum Domine libera nos" (From the fury of the Northmen, Good Lord Deliver Us).

Their prayers were in vain. Stimulated by their success and encouraged by a fine spring the Danes sailed up the estuary of the River Thames towards London. The Merceans offered little opposition and their leader, Borthwolf, the King, was soon defeated. London was captured, the houses set on fire, the gold and silver from the churches carried away in triumph, and innocent householders cruelly butchered. Only Winchester, the capital of Southern England, remained in Saxon hands. Ferocious, treacherous, but tremendously daring and full of energy, the Danes, determined to rush on to take Winchester. Leaving their ships behind, safely anchored in the Thames and carrying their stolen goods on rough English carts, they began the long march

out of London, over the Thames and into Surrey. They came by the Old Roman Road, the Stane Street, leading from London to the Sussex Coast. Meanwhile, in Winchester, Ethelwulf, the King of Wessex, with his many sons, and his leaders, was attending morning Mass in the great church. All was calm and peaceful. If there was a great war cloud over England, it seemed far away from here. News came from London of burnings, murders and of the imminent dangers to all at Winchester. Then followed weary anxious days. The fate of England hung in the balance. The great bell of Winchester Church rang out without pause day and night, sending out its dreadful warning. Young and old hastened to join the King's army.

Already, the "Comrades" Or special fighting men, who followed the King everywhere, were in Winchester. He sent out for the Freemen and the Thegns, and the Royal servants scattered over his kingdom of Wessex. Each in turn brought his own servants, many of whom were fighting men. Soon mighty and determined army was gathered and the march began. The burnings and sackings and cruel slaughter in London seemed to weld the Saxon Army together as no amount of training could do. All this time, the Danes were marching steadily through Surrey leaving behind them the villages of Wimbledon, Epsom and Leatherhead, razed to the ground. Finally, they reached the towering white cliffs of Dorking while beyond, they saw mile after mile of dense forest, almost impenetrable. The tiny settlement of Dorking was left a mass of blazing ruins and they marched on a further three or four miles to a camp high above the trees and here it was decided to spend the night. Anstiebury Camp proved an excellent resting place, just as it had been for many tribes of Ancient Britons in past centuries. Fires were lit and tents were pitched and the great Danish banner, with the huge black raven, floated high overhead. All around was thick forest, pines, firs, heather and bracken on the high ground to the west, huge oaks and dense hazel bushes to the south. About two miles away was a small clearing, covered with thick wiry grass. No sign of life could be seen. The wind dropped as darkness fell and the mists floated over and through the branches of the trees. There was a deathly silence everywhere. In the Danish camp, the splendid mail shirts were laid aside, the horned helmets tilted back or taken off, while the dreaded axes were placed lovingly by the sides of their owners, who lay flat on their backs, gazing quietly at the stars above. The Viking warriors had expected to meet the Saxon Army long before this. They were not used to this kind of warfare. Brave and bold in the open, where the enemy could be seen and attacked ruthlessly, in this unearthly atmosphere of dampness and darkness they were becoming tired, restless and afraid, something which no amount of fighting had ever done to them. The way to Winchester certainly seemed long and hard at this moment. Down below, in the forest, unbeknown to the Danes, lay the Saxon host, gathered round the grassy enclosure. They slept upon the bracken beneath the trees. Earlier, they

had seen the twinkling lights of fires on Anstiebury. They had said their prayers and had sung the Latin Chants once more, careful lest their voices would carry too far in the still night air. Their weapons were already prepared for the morrow. At the first sign of light in the early morning, the Danes packed up their tents and prepared to march. A silent host of tired, hungry warriors left the camp and resentfully marched away down the slope. On their shoulders, they carried their huge double-headed axes and by their sides were sharp swords still stained with blood.

In the Saxon camp all was ready. Ethelwulf and his son Ethelbald, with their picked fighting men, were in the centre. Across the grassy clearing the Saxon bowmen were hidden in the trees. Clad in brown homespun tunics, they formed a perfect camouflage against the brown tree trunks and the rich bronze of the bracken. The younger warriors were at the edge of the forest to cut off the retreat. Many a youth of fifteen years waited impatiently for his first glimpse of the hated Pagans. All eyes were on the dusty road. In the still morning air, the tramp of feet could be plainly heard.

The Viking warriors, filled with dismay, looked at the dense forest ahead, then turned angrily on their leaders. At that moment, a bugle call rang out from the woods, and the Saxon host, thirsting for revenge, fell upon their enemies. In vain the Danish leader shouted, in vain the Danish bugles called. Warriors in their hundreds were now massed together in the clearing, and the Saxon arrows poured into their midst. The Danes called to their Gods repeatedly. Some regained courage and wielded their two edged battle axes. They remembered what they had been told by their forefathers. "If you are killed fighting bravely, you will ride across the rainbow, to Valhalla, the hall of the Gods, there to feast with Odin, the Father." A solid wall of picked Saxons fought relentlessly round their King. Suddenly the Danish leader fell, and the huge black standard crashed to the ground. There was a ghastly cry of anguish, and the ranks broke. From all sides, the Saxons rushed in for the kill. The way of escape to the north was closed fast, so the terrified Danes rushed headlong down the narrow road to the south, not knowing where they were going. The slaughter was terrible. Bodies were piled up in great heaps, over the roadway and all over the clearing, being thickest round the fallen Danish leader. Danish blood flowed like water until the fighting ceased. Every prisoner was killed without mercy, and the wounded left to die, their calls of agony passing unheeded.

The fight continued all the afternoon. It was a terrible struggle "Warriors thick as ears of corn charging upon either side and rivers of blood rolling away the heads and limbs of the slain" According to a later Saxon Chronicle "The king and his men made a greater a slaughter of them than had ever been made of the pagans, and gained the victory." The victorious Saxons left the scene of battle and went towards the slopes of Leith Hill, where

they lit their watch fires and while resting, they told their gory tales of the fight late into the night.

A Saxon poem, written about the year A.D. 900, describes this battle. Translated, it reads as follows:

"And death doomed fell the ship men,

the field streamed with warriors' blood.

When rose at morning tide the glorious star,

The sun, God's shining handle, until sank

The noble creature to its setting.

There lay many a northern warrior struck with darts

Shot from above the shield.

The Saxons had one more task to perform. As the sun rose once more, the English dead were laid in a long trench somewhere on the slopes of Leith Hill, with their feet towards the rising sun. This great victory saved Southern England for Christianity and for over twenty years no heathen invaders came south over the River Thames.

Draft Mole Valley Local Plan 2020-2037

Many thanks to those of you who copied in the parish council to their responses to the above. Councillors took note of these responses when considering the parish council response. The following information was taken from the MVDC website (November 2021):

Now the publication period has closed, we will collate all the representations and, in February next year, we intend to submit the Plan and the representations to the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government who will appoint a planning inspector. The Inspector will consider the Plan and the representations in an Examination-in-Public and there are likely to be public hearings on the Plan next year. The Inspector will issue a report on the Plan which will set out whether the Plan is legally compliant and sound or how it can be made so. If we agree with the Inspector's findings, we will adopt the Plan.

Points of note from the November meeting

Work is continuing on the Community Hub project and the Neighbourhood Development Plan. A reminder that a team has set out on a quest to set up a Community Hub in the Ockley School buildings. Please contact Gill Christie at gill@c21mediagroup.com if you are interested in hearing more information. A village meeting will be held to discuss ideas. Further meetings have been held with other organisations (MVDC, Surrey Community Action) regarding the Neighbourhood Development Plan. A Character Appraisal of the village is being carried out. This involves walking around the village and gathering data. A public meeting will be held when the draft appraisal is available so that your views can be heard. Parishioners will be asked to complete a further survey in the New Year. Important sections of the plan will include transport and parking, natural environment, demand for housing and type/mix/design on houses wanted in the village.

THE GARDEN IN JANUARY AND FEBRUARY

The start of the new year provides a quieter and more sedate 'pause' in the gardening year. January is a wonderful month for all us gardeners – both amateur and professional - to **take stock of the green spaces** we nurture. Whether sitting indoors in front of a cosy fire or escaping into the fresh air to work off some Christmas cake, it's a great time to **reflect** on the past year and to **start making plans** for the gardening year ahead.

More importantly than ever, the start of **THIS** new year is a perfect time for us all to make some **environmentally responsible** new year gardening resolutions. These might include:

- cutting back (or stopping) buying compost containing peat (and buying it by the load rather than individual bags if you have the space to store it).
- recycling and reusing garden plastics wherever possible.
- creating wildlife havens within our gardens, from putting up a nesting box in a small garden to developing a 're-wilded' area if you have more space to play with.
- collecting water wherever you can, in water butts or any other suitable large containers (that can also be used by wildlife).
- building new or improving your compost area to maximise garden waste recycling, including building a simple wire structure for collected leaves to rot down.

There are many other ways we can do our bit so use this early part of the year to google ideas, read gardening magazines and ask gardening friends for suggestions.

Winter is a good time to **plan** which vegetables you are going to grow and where you are going to grow them. Make sure to choose veg you will actually eat! Plan a rotation system to ensure the same crops are not grown in the same beds to help prevent disease build-up.

This winter hiatus provides a perfect opportunity for a good **clean** and sharpen of tools, as well as a **tidy and sort** of that green house and potting shed you've been meaning to do all year. You can get pots and seed trays ready for **sowing**, starting with sowing seed indoors (or in a heated greenhouse or propagator) for early crops like lettuce, summer brassicas (e.g. cabbages and cauliflowers), spinach, salad onions and turnips. From mid-February onwards, sow tomato and cucumber seed for greenhouse growing. Source your seed potatoes if you have not already done so. Save egg boxes as they will come in handy for chitting a little later on. You can also start to sow sweet peas indoors or in a greenhouse.

For when you do want to **get out and active** in your garden, there are always some jobs to do at this time of year. Many plants benefit from a **winter prune**, including established wisteria (shortening shoots that were summer pruned back to two to three buds). Also prune apple trees (not cordons), and currants and gooseberries need to be trimmed by about a third, cutting out crossing branches.

Moving through February, **prune** *late*-flowering (group 3) clematis, grasses, cornus and shrub roses. And unless the ground is frozen or waterlogged, January and February are good months to **plant** dormant deciduous shrubs and trees. Buying bare root plants at this time of year is often a good value option.

Finally, it's not too early to think about what you might want to enter for the **Okewood**, **Ockley and Forest Green Summer Fair**. Returning to the cricket ground in Okewood Hill on **Saturday 13th August 2022** after a two year 'pause', let's all help to make this year's show blooming marvellous.

Plant of the month – Hellebore (remove old and brown leaves that might hide emerging flowers)


