
FOREST GREEN AND THE FIRST CRUISE MISSILE

By 1943, in the dark days of the Second World War, the tide was slowly beginning to turn against Nazi Germany. Rommel's Panzer Army had been defeated in the Western Desert at El Alamein, Italy had surrendered following the Allied invasion of Scilly, the Germans had lost the horrendous sub zero battle against the Russians at Stalingrad, anti submarine measures in the North Atlantic were becoming ever more effective, and significantly the USA had been drawn into the War following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbour. Germany recognised that it needed new and decisive weapons to overcome the increasing strength of the Allies and avoid defeat.

To this end pilotless aircraft carrying a high explosive payload were developed - rockets. These "Vengeance Weapons" were built and tested and the first, known as the V1, was hurriedly deployed 80 years ago in response to the Allied invasion of Normandy on June 6th 1944 - D Day. The V1 was effectively the first cruise missile, a pulse jet propelled rocket carrying a payload of 850kgs of Amatol explosive, plus whatever remained of the 150 gallons of petrol in the tank. The rockets were to be fired from many especially constructed launching ramps in occupied northern France and Holland and were to be directed almost entirely at London. They had a limited range, and a very basic gyroscope based guidance system powered by compressed air tanks. On the nose of the weapon was a propellor that was driven round by the airstream passing over it, this acted as a crude measure of the distance flown and was set to an adjustable value such that when it was reached the elevators tilted up and thus tipped the nose of the rocket down. This caused the remaining petrol to all run to front of the tank and the pulse jet engine to cut out. The V1, or Flying Bomb as they were also known, would then crash to the ground, the fusing of the explosive being designed to detonate on initial impact rather than the rocket having any ground penetration capability, this being in order to maximise structural damage to civilian buildings.

From the British public's point of view, the popping exhaust noise that the V1 made was distinctive, but it was when the noise stopped that immediate action was required, for the weapon was then on its way down to create a substantial explosion that could completely flatten several houses in one go. Defensive measures against the V1's were initially limited, at about twenty feet long they were a small target for anti-aircraft fire, and their high speed meant that only the very fastest fighter aircraft could get close enough to shoot them down. A few were tipped over by daring RAF pilots using the wingtip of their aircraft if they had run out of ammunition. Steps to prevent the rockets being launched were taken in the form of air strikes against the launching ramps. A further tactic was

also used - deception.
Although the rockets
were landing on London,
the British press were
instructed to report that
they were landing north
west of the capital, it
being known that this
information would find its
was back to Germany via
neutral countries and the
distance settings of the
rockets might then be



reduced believing that was necessary in order to hit the intended target. The British government hoped that this deception would lead to the rockets landing in Kent and Surrey rather than the more densely populated areas of the capital.

So what has this got to do with Forest Green? Well, in the summer of 1944 a V1 exploded here, just off Pisley Lane. Two Forest Green residents, now both in their 80s, still live in the same houses that they did as young children in 1944 and both remember the event.

In 1944 Tot Charman was about six years of age, he was at home with his mother and sister when they heard a "Doodlebug" (as they were nicknamed) coming. When the engine cut out they knew it was time to run for cover, and although they had a Morrison Shelter (a substantial steel box frame with mesh sides that was intended to provide protection while sleeping) there was no time to get into it and both children and their mother took refuge under the kitchen table. Tot's father, Tom, was working with others up on Leith Hill and they heard the "buzz bomb" approaching, heard the engine stop, and heard and saw the subsequent explosion. Tom was told to go home to check that everyone was alright. He found the family were uninjured, but there was some damage to the cowshed roof with rafters being displaced, as they still are to this day apparently. Tom subsequently found a sizeable jagged metal fragment of the bomb in a patch of burnt grass on his land.

Ivor Duffel was about the same age as Tot and was playing down by the stream behind his home with other children, making sand castles in the sandy silt that washes down off the hills. Ivor's mother also heard the distinctive noise, then heard it stop ominously and shouted to the children who ran home to take cover. Although the bungalow was hundreds of metres from the site of the explosion the blast moved the family's wooden home on its brick pier foundations and it subsequently had to be carefully eased back into position using a tractor and ropes. Pisley Farmhouse was

the closest building to the explosion and was probably extensively damaged.

There was no crater from the explosion and it is thought that the device may have exploded a little distance above the ground when it hit the trees, certainly Ivor recalls that there were pieces of it caught in the trees high up. Tot also remembers that there was a piece, "no bigger than a bath" that existed on the ground for sometime afterwards. One piece believed to have come from the V1 was found by a local resident




An unexploded V1, its short wings torn off when it crashed, is examined probably by bomb disposal experts of the Royal Engineers

many years ago and has been retained as a relic of the conflict, see photo.

It is estimated that about 7,000 V1s were launched, around a thousand were shot down, but as with the local example many fell short with only 2,340 reaching London. Nevertheless over 5,000 people were killed, a further 16,000 were injured, and substantial damage was caused by the weapon. The V1 menace was superseded by the V2 which was a much more sophisticated ballistic missile, for the V2 travelled faster than the speed of sound and therefore gave people no audible warning and no time to take cover. As the Allies advanced the rocket launch sites, already extensively attacked from the air, were progressively overrun and the rocket menace came to an end in March 1945, shortly before the end of the Second World War in Europe.

PARISH ARCHIVE

The Parish Archives collected by Briony Thomas and now stored in the Courtyard at Jayes contain copies of the Parish Magazine. Initially collected in hard-backed books and combined with other local parishes covering 1885-1899 for Ockley. Called Dawn of Day, it covered Capel, Ockley and Newdigate.

The 1885 magazine varied in length. There is a splendid entry in March 1885. Football On Shrove Tuesday, the people of Ockley determined to have a 'family' game of football 'A football scramble without any particular rules or bounds' the poster said. "The players divided themselves into North and South and applied themselves gamely to their work, upon the ball being thrown up from the steps of the Pump. The Southern's at once invaded the Northern Territory, where they were cordially received by Messrs. G. Adams and C. Dodman who successfully took the ball in hand and led an enthusiastic 'following' into the nearest ditch".

The description continues for several episodes of colourful language. "Victory thus rests with the North - 3 goals to 1. We may remark that the novel play seemed to produce mixed sensations among the passing quadrupeds. The Doctor's little cob kindly in waiting with splints and bandages so far showed sympathy with the horseplay on the Green that it tried some kicking on its own account."

July 1885 records the cessation of the Ockley 'Salts and Senna' Club which had met for dinner and amusements on the Green. "There can be little doubt that there is more honour in the breach than in the observance of such annual feast days not simply because of the members themselves so much as on the account of the congregation of travelling carts and shows which come from various parts of the country whose occupants most certainly contribute nothing to the better health, morals or purity generally to our villages, but very much to the contrary."

Then there is a gap until 1942 when the magazines continue to date (with a few omissions!).

The Church produced magazine available for an annual subscription was succeeded by WOOF circulated free and containing advertisements in 2020.

The 1944 magazines consisted of 4 pages printed on both sides of a sheet of paper smaller than A4 and folded, presumably because of the wartime shortage of paper. Many familiar names are mentioned, in March the return of John Prideaux after 4 years' service abroad (he came back to join the planning team for D Day). April records the death of Mrs Arbuthnot (John Prideaux's grandmother) who lived at Elderslie from 1895 to 1939 when John and Joan Prideaux took over. Among other things she ran the

Boy Scouts and the Duchess of Albany Girls' home at Orchard Cottage. She was buried at Ockley.

There is a note in Briony's writing on the August Magazine saying the first Doodlebug to hit Ockley landed on 10th June.

By 1977 the magazine had changed to 16 pages of A5 size with some advertisements and included The Sign, a national magazine included by many parishes. I have chosen 1977 for an extract as that was the year of Queen Elizabeth II Jubilee. There were reports from many organisations in the Village, The Mothers Union, The Women's Institute, The Young Wives, Darby and Joan, Dramatic Society, Angling Society, Stoolball and Cricket. Many more people were prepared to involve themselves in local organisations. For instance, the departure of the Stuart Thompson family is recorded, he chaired the Flower show, was secretary and treasurer of the Village Hall and a leading member of the Dramatic Society, he and his family were moving away and thanked for all they had done for the village.

The main Jubilee event was a Country Fair on Monday 6th June. There had been a disco (organised by the Motor Cycle Club) on Friday and two Church services on Sunday. On Monday events started with a cricket match, North v South. The Fair with Stalls and Sideshows started with a Fancy Dress Competition at 2.30, Junior Sports at 3.30, Presentation of Prizes at 4.30 and the planting of a Silver Jubilee Tree by John Prideaux (Later Sir John) (Does anyone know which tree it is?) at 4.45. Maypole and Country Dancing at 5, Senior Sports at 5.30, It's a Knockout at 7.30 Barbecue at 8pm and at 8.30 a Barn Dance to The Heck Speckles Phantom with a name like that it must be good' says the Rector, Maurice Collins. At 9.30 the Draw (of the lucky Programme Prize) and at 10pm the lighting of the bonfire at the same time as HM The Queen was due to light a bonfire at Windsor and bonfires would be lit all over the country.

For those interested in such things, the bar will open at 4.30. It is not clear when it will close' said the Rector! So much for licensing laws.

There is a clear definition of the split between North and South, a line through the pump on the Village Green and at right angles to the A29. Oliver and Jackie Reed who lived at Broome Hall and were involved in the village, judged the Children's Fancy Dress. I remember my children receiving a prize. I am listed as a member of the organising committee with the Rector, Philip Edgell and Joan Midgley all sadly now dead.

There has been a long history of events in Ockley! The Lord of the Manor obtained permission for an annual Market on St Margaret's Day in the 14th century but that was probably held near St Margaret's Church, the then site of the village.

OH, YES IT IS!

The pantomime version of Jack and the Beanstalk was first performed in 1819. The story evolved from a combination of different folk tales going back hundreds of years. A reference to the popular Cornish folk tale of Jack the Giant Killer appears in Shakespeare's King Lear but one of the first written versions comes from a 1734 story: Jack Spriggins and the Enchanted Bean.

Inspired by the story about Jack who sells the family cow (in our case Ulez the cow), for a handful of beans, Ockley Dramatic Society's February production of Jack and the Beanstalk gave us the whole story and much more. There were references to popular sketches, original jokes, catchy music and dancing, all proving that pantomime is a vibrant and dynamic art form that appeals to all ages. All of this was punctuated by perfectly timed sound effects.

The dialogue was really engaging. There was also a mixture of corny and clever sometimes derivative jokes such as: "what's the opposite of a croissant? – A happy uncle", or "Old Ma Trott had a farm A I E I O" and the shop sketch inspired by the famous "fork 'andles" from the Two Ronnies.

This was the first pantomime the Society had put on since before COVID, and people are still cautiously participating in large gatherings. However, the six performances were reasonably well attended, and we estimate that

overall, about 15% of the village saw it.

With that in mind, we set out to test audience reaction, taking particular care to consult the children, conscious that a pantomime is designed to entertain all the family and that one of the Society's aims is to encourage children to develop a love for theatre. We talked to parents, grandparents and with the help of mums at the Toddler Group we were able to get the views of our youngest residents.

Everyone we spoke to liked it and they all said they would come to a future pantomime. One grandparent complained that there should have been more audience participation, yet the children loved the Narrator who appealed to them regularly to react noisily to key moments in the story. Here are some of the children's impressions:

The children speak.

"The dancers were great, and I liked the singing, also Jack and Jill characters were my favourite." (Age 10)

"I like the spooky one and Jack! They put Jack in the cage." (Age 2 and a half)

"I really enjoyed it all and I was looking forward to Act 2 in the interval. Jack was my favourite character." (Age 7)

"I liked the silly bits where the shop keeper didn't know what they wanted. Favourite character was Mabel in the blue checked shirt. (Age four and a half)


"I thought it was really good, my favourite character was Jack. I liked the songs and dancing. Well done!" (Age 6)

Pantomime has a long and noble history. It emerged in England in the 1700s but

The principal boy typically played by a young woman and the Dame a comic male role played by a man in drag. Audience participation became a key component with performers engaging the audience with sing along, booing and cheering.

WE LOOK FORWARD TO SEEING YOU

THE GARDEN IN MAY & JUNE

As I write this in early April, the rain is still coming down. It seems to have been raining all winter. In fact, the south of England experienced its wettest February in 2024 since 1836! It has also been unseasonably warm and the second warmest February since 1884. Other warm Februarys include 2023, 2022 and 2019, so there seems little doubt that our climate is changing and, as gardeners, we are probably more aware than most. However, we cannot be complacent and there might still be the odd frosty night so do not put out tender plants too early. Still, things are warming up, the days are getting longer and it's time to spend as much time as possible enjoying your garden.

In May, spring can still be very much in the air – with us enjoying the jewelled colours of late flowering tulips, rhododendrons and spring bedding – but there is definitely a promise of early summer. By the middle of May, the threat of frost has almost certainly past and we can now plant a whole host of vegetable and flower seedlings, both under glass or outside now that the soil has warmed up. And then by June, the promise becomes a reality and summer arrives. There are always jobs to do but we must take time to enjoy the fruits of our labour. Invite friends and family to eat, drink and be merry in the spaces we've created; find a sunny spot to quietly read a good book; have a snooze in a deckchair whilst listening to the radio; or simply sit with our faces in the sun, feeling proud of all we've achieved so far.

There are many cottage garden favourites that appear at this time of year, bringing such variety of colour and interest to our gardens. This includes peonies and roses; aquilegia and thalictrum; delphiniums, lupins, camassia, echinops, eryngium and the many types of allium; Also the colourful groundcover from geraniums and the lime-green of alchemilla mollis (this makes a



great cut flower combination with blue delphiniums): and the scent from lilac, sweetpeas, stocks, honeysuckle, lavender and philadelphus..... in between enjoying the fruits of your labour, there are always plenty of jobs to do.....

Prepare for growth by staking and tying in tall-stemmed perennials. You can use bamboo or 'foraged' sticks but it's often worth investing in a variety of metal supports that will never need replacing. Trim and tidy up spreading plants such as allysum, arabis and aubretia. Trim them back quite hard and fresh new growth will appear. Tie in vigorous climbers such as clematis and rambling rose as they grow.

And do keep up with the weeds, which will now be trying to wreak havoc in your borders. Little and often is best, especially on dry days. Also keep an eye out for slugs, aphids and other pests, picking them out when spotted. And keep watering regularly, especially pots, preferably from a water butt and only using tap water as a last resort.

Plant - It's too late for bare-root roses so go for potted ones from a good supplier. Main-crop potatoes should be planted by now and early potatoes will need earthing up. Continue successional sowing of beetroot, cabbage, carrots, salad onions, lettuce, peas, broad beans and radishes. Get tomato plants going in grow-bags in the greenhouse from the beginning of May, and by the beginning of June, you can plant them outside.

In late May/early June, fill pots and hanging baskets with annuals such as petunia, impatiens, trailing lobelia and begonia to name but a few. Mid to late May is often the best time to start planting out seedlings after hardening plants off outside (either in a cold frame or sheltered area) for a couple of weeks before planting them up.

Propagate by taking softwood cuttings from shrubs such as philadelphus, ribes and sambucus. Divide, replant and water clump forming springflowering perennials such as doronicums, pulmonarias and primula.

Prune Clematis montana and early-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering such as forsythia, kerria japonica and spiraea arguta ('straight-after-flowering' is not a bad rule to follow on shrubs in general). Lightly trim formal evergreen hedging such as box, ideally with hand shears.

And finally, we hope **Saturday August 10**th, is firmly in your diaries as the date for the **Ockley, Okewood & Forest Green Summer Fair**. This year's schedule will soon be delivered through doors, and will be available from various outlets. So do look at the categories and enter your best produce to be judged by RHS judges. 

What is Pickleball? Pickleball is a fun sport that combines elements of badminton, tennis, and table tennis. Played both indoors or outdoors on a badminton-sized court and a slightly modified tennis net. Two or four players use solid paddles made of wood or composite materials to hit a perforated polymer ball, over a net. Created in America in 1965 Pickleball is the fastest growing sport in the World and is played by 36.5 million Americans.

How can I join in? We run club sessions up to twice per week (based upon demand) on a Tuesday morning or Wednesday afternoon and Sunday afternoon or evening. These are organised via a Pickleball WhatsApp group and beginners are introduced to the sport as well as being helped to develop their game.

SURREY SCHOOLS SECURE £6,000 FOR ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECTS

Five Surrey primary schools have been awarded a combined total of £6,000, which they will be using to deliver projects that benefit their environment, as part of Surrey's council-led Rethink Waste scheme.

Cobham Free School won the top prize of £2,500 and will be using the funds to help construct a vertical garden and install solar panels. The second prize of £1,500 was granted to Hurst Green Infant School to enhance its playground to safeguard wildlife. Barnsbury Primary School in Woking received £1,000 to develop a rainwater garden. Esher Church School and St Francis Catholic Primary School in Caterham were each awarded £500 to contribute to their green initiatives.

Cllr. Marisa Heath, Chair of the Surrey Environment Partnership, said: "Reducing what we throw away is one of the best things we can do to help fight climate change. So it's fantastic to see so many Surrey residents coming together through Rethink Waste to learn about waste reduction and to donate to local schools so they can help the environment."

Rethink Waste, an online platform, encourages Surrey residents to sign up and engage in a variety of waste-minimising and recycling-enhancing activities. By participating, members collect points that can be donated to a multitude of causes, including but not limited to, supporting local schools. From 1 November 2023 to 29 February 2024, the initiative saw 4,108 donations, accumulating 685,760 points for 17 primary schools.

Rethink Waste is preparing for another phase of school donations from 1 April to 14 June, with a further £6,000 prize fund available for schools that garner the most community support. Schools interested in this opportunity must register by 28 March 2024.

Launched by the Surrey Environment Partnership, which comprises Surrey County Council and the county's 11 district and borough councils, Rethink Waste aims to cut household waste production across Surrey. This reduction not only benefits the environment but also aids councils by decreasing the costs of managing the waste. Over 7,000 households have joined the scheme, engaging in activities that foster sustainable living practices and carbon footprint reduction.

The charity had its annual meeting in early April where there was an update on Hurtwood matters. Three important points were raised:

- 1. Car park maintenance has been delayed by the weather and is still on the to-do list when the land dries out. All of the car parks have new signs so it's easier for visitors to find them. And plans are underway to improve the entrance to Car Park 1 at the top of Holmbury Hill.
- The chairman, Antony Collins, is stepping down after four years. He
 was thanked for his leadership and contribution to regularising the
 charity's governance and improving processes. The Hurtwood
 Treasurer, Assheton Don, is stepping in as temporary chair until a new
 person is appointed.
- 3. Two guest speakers, Pauline Lane and Peter Jones, from Guildford Bee Keepers Association, gave a talk about the challenges facing pollinators in 2024.

Besides the worldwide population growth with the intensification of agriculture, habitat loss and the use of chemicals, the major threat to honey bees and other pollinators is the spread of the Asian Hornet – an apex predator. They eat bees, destroy colonies plus eat insects and spiders. Last year 72 nests were discovered in England.

What to do about the Asian Hornet? If you SEE IT, SNAP IT, APP IT. Send photo and location to the Asian Hornet Watch (Free App). We must do all we can to protect our native bees who provide pollination of over 33% of the crops that are our food.

NEWS FROM THE BELFRY New Peal at Ockley

A peal was rung at St Margaret's last month by a band of visiting ringers. They had been trying to arrange this for over a year as the bells had not been available to ring, firstly for work being carried out in the church and then because the treble was waiting to be repaired. Taking

around three hours to ring makes a peal the bell ringers' equivalent of a marathon, requiring concentration and stamina to complete. To be scored as a peal the bells must be rung continuously in the different sequences, without visual aids, with the pattern of ringing determined by the chosen method which can be depicted by a line in a diagram. Notices were put out on social media and at the church and we hope that this rare event did not inconvenience our neighbours unduly.

Over 300 years ago ringers were aware that the maximum number of different orders for seven bells to sound was 5040 – factorial 7, for the mathematically-minded (7x6x5x4x3x2x1=5040). Most change ringing then was done on six, seven or eight bells and as 5040 changes would take around 3 hours to ring, it was feasible to attempt. The maximum number on 8 bells (5040x8=40,320) would take around 24 hours to ring and was considered impossible (although it has since been done). In the early 18th Century much effort was spent working out how to compose a peal of 5040 different changes, in a recognised pattern or method so that no sequence was repeated. There were many attempts to ring a peal, some probably successful, but a peal rung in Norwich in 1715 is the first one for which there is a record of where it was rung and by whom.

There had been 33 peals rung in our tower since the bells were installed in 1701 although the first was not until 1891 and the most recent was in 2012. The band that rang in April were complimentary about the tone of the bells but admitted they had found them challenging to ring. It is not something our local ringers have any desire to attempt, we find a quarter peal, taking about 45 minutes enough of a challenge.

Bellringing has developed from generation to generation in Britain for over three hundred years. It is a wonderful blend of sport, music, exercise, friendship, a challenge of wits and skill which gives great satisfaction when it goes right. If you would like to find out more, and perhaps help to preserve the tradition, please come along and have a go, under supervision, or contact me. Practice nights are at St. Margaret's in Ockley, on Wednesdays from 7.45 to 9.15, except the first week of the month when we are at St John's in Capel.

REPORT ASIAN HORNET SIGHTINGS

- The Reigate Beekeepers' Association is calling on the public to help spot and report Asian Hornet sightings as we head towards spring
- The destructive insect poses the greatest threat to our native honey bees in a generation
- Experts warns there could be catastrophic consequences for the UK's wider ecology if the insects are allowed to become established here
- Asian Hornets can become aggressive when defending nests, posing a risk to public health

Asian Hornets are an incredibly destructive invasive species that specialise in preying on honeybee hives - one Asian Hornet alone can kill 30-60 honeybees per day. First discovered in the UK in 2016, the insect has travelled to our shores from northern Europe, where there are now over half a million nests annually in France alone.

By 2022, just 16 Asian Hornet nests had been discovered in this country. But in 2023, this increased dramatically to 72 nests in 56 different locations, with Kent and the South East most predominantly affected. But there have been sightings in many other locations, including as far north as Scotland, and a credible sighting already reported in January this year, sparking fears the non-native insect may become established in the UK.

Experts are keen to point out that this is not just a problem for beekeepers, but poses a significant risk to public health. Asian Hornets are aggressively defensive of their nests, which are often built in hedgerows and brambles, meaning disturbances by unsuspecting individuals could have dangerous consequences.





An Asian Hornet can be identified by its very distinct markings - they're a similar size to a European Hornet, which is two or three times the size of a common wasp, and are black with distinct yellow lower leg.

The public are being urged to stay vigilant, and encouraged to report any

suspected sightings on the Asian Hornet Watch app, which is available to download on iOS and Android. Expert teams from the National Bee Unit, part of Defra, will then be deployed to track hornets back to their nests, which are then destroyed.

Note from Ed: European hornets. though scarily big, are less aggressive than wasps and good for the garden make sure you get the right one!




